F.B.P.C.A. Special Recognition Award

Mark Myhre (Town of Palm Beach)

Mark Myhre was a lifelong resident of Sea Isle City and a lifelong Lifeguard. His father Frank and Uncle John were Lifeguards and his brother Mike was also a longtime Lifeguard.

Previously, the patrol had medics to take care of the cuts, bruises, and other minor medical emergencies. Medic Mark Myhre, as an EMT and a member of the Sea Isle City Ambulance Corps., revamped the procedures used in handling medical emergencies. The most up-to-date



equipment was on hand and trained individuals prepared for land and water emergencies were always on duty.

After moving to South Florida, Mark started working at the Lake Worth Beach Patrol, he worked himself up over the years and was appointed Captain in 1983. He served 20 plus years on the Lake Worth Beach Patrol, and retired as Chief.

After a short retirement, he returned to surf lifesaving working full time for the Town of Palm Beach and part time for Lantana. He had a resurgence in his participation in competition and has been a formidable competitor in local, regional, and national tournaments. He is the captain of the competition team for the Town of Palm Beach where he aids in equipment maintenance as well as training sessions.

DON MAY PALM BEACH COUNTY

Don May's love of the beach came at a very young age. Here you see him stretching for one of his first beach workouts. He began seasonal lifeguarding in Avalon, NJ in 1969 where he worked the busy summers of the Jersey shore. From there he decided to go to the true home of endless summers, south Florida. He began working Hollywood Beach part-time and was quickly picked up as a full time lifeguard. He worked as a Marine Safety Officer for 10 years before heading to Palm Beach County Ocean Rescue where he was hired as a captain. He served as a captain for 10 years and then was promoted to Chief. In his



tenure as chief he was instrumental in getting the lifeguard headquarter building at Juno Pier signed off by the County. The headquarter building gave County lifeguards not only needed offices and locker rooms but also a place to do training. The north county training officer and captain's offices moved to this location. He also was pivotal in getting an ATV for response at each beach. This enabled lifeguards to respond quickly to calls and return to their posts.

Don May worked with his staff to upgrade the County radios to 800 mHz which enhanced communication over the 47 mile stretch of Palm Beach County's coastline.

Don May was a true component of the Palm Beach County competition team and his knowledge of events, commanding presence, sound decision making, and ability to clearly explain events (sometime repeatedly) made him the perfect candidate for head official for the U.S.L.A. Southeast Regional Lifesaving Tournament for decades.

Don's contributions to surf lifesaving over the past 50 years have made New Jersey and Florida beaches that much safer.



Alexandre L. O'Connor Fort Lauderdale Ocean Rescue

As an Ocean Rescue EMT, Alex is responsible for the supervision of swimming and related recreational activities at Fort Lauderdale beach and the prompt performance of emergency lifesaving and basic life support, as occasions require. Lifeguard O'Connor has worked in this capacity for 9 tears total, with 4 years seasonal part-time as a Summer lifeguard in Long Branch, New Jersey, and 5 years permanent full-time with Fort Lauderdale Ocean Rescue.





minor medical treatment and/or lifesaving basic life support when needed; educating the public on life-threatening hazards and how to avoid them; representing the City of Fort Lauderdale Beach in local, regional and national lifeguard competitions; participating as a coach and trainer in Fort Lauderdale's Junior Lifeguard Program; interacting with the public on a daily basis to provide information of all sorts, responding to complaints, worries and questions; responding to many stressful situations in an uncontrolled environment while maintaining a professional demeanor.

Lifeguard O'Connor holds certifications as an Emergency Medical Technician (Spring 2014) from Barry University, American Heart Association Basic Life Support, CPR and AED administration, and American Red Cross Lifeguard Training. She is also a United States Lifesaving Association Southeast Regional Certified Lifeguard Training Officer. Her educational background includes a B.S. in Business Administration (May 2011) from the University of San Diego, San Diego, CA; post-baccalaureate science course work (Fall 2011-Spring 2013) from Brookdale Community College, Lincroft, NJ; and post-baccalaureate science course work (Fall 2012) from Ocean County Community College, Toms River, NJ.

In addition to her primary full-time responsibilities in Fort Lauderdale, Alex also works as a part-time lifeguard in Hallandale Beach and Miami Beach, and provides the same high-level of service at those neighboring municipalities.

Alexandre O'Connor is the current defending United States Lifesaving Association's National Women's Surfboat Champion. She was also the silver medalist in American Ironwoman at this year's USLA National Lifeguard Championships. She was named 2017 Most Valuable Lifeguard by the USLA Fort Lauderdale Chapter Competition Team.

She is the consummate professional in every aspect of her job performance making her an ambassador for not just Fort Lauderdale, but the noble profession of ocean lifesaving. In a time where the other public safety occupations get most of the public's attention, Alexandre wears a banner for ocean lifeguards everywhere. She is never afraid to speak her mind when standing up for her profession or issues she feels are important. Alexandre O'Connor lives the motto "Lifeguard for Life".

The division's main objective is to observe, protect, and respond to the needs of residents and the nearly 3 million visitors that enjoy their county's lifeguarded beaches and surrounding areas each year. Lifeguards effectively manage medical emergencies, traumatic injuries, environmental emergencies, near drowning's, marine accidents, lost children, social disturbances, and enforce the County's Park Ordinances on their beaches and adjacent waterways.

The Marine Rescue Division developed from its humble beginnings around 1960. In 1991 the division evolved from the Parks and Recreation Department to the Department of Public Safety. Their training standards were elevated to incorporate Emergency Medical Technicians, code enforcement officers, licensed United States Coast Guard Captains, Advance SCUBA divers, and Rescue Divers. The staff is composed of 2 Paramedics, 9 EMT's, and 5 Emergency Medical Responder's. The Marine Rescue Division's elevated standard of training led to the advanced response capabilities that they now provide today. The Emergency Communications Center (911) dispatches the Division to land and water borne emergencies along the 27 plus miles of coastline that surround Manatee County. The major importance of this advancement was that they became a part of the 911 system and not just a user of it. Lifeguards play a critical role in the event of a natural disaster in Manatee County. The Division collaborates with law enforcement and Emergency Management officials when the barrier islands are threatened or evacuated due to pending natural disasters such as tropical storms and hurricanes. They respond and assist in search and rescue, medical triage, patient care/transport, and even traffic control. Lifeguards are some of the last basic life-support (BLS) emergency personnel to evacuate the island as a life-threatening storm approaches. Post-storm, the Division is involved in such activities as search and recovery operations, medical care and transportation support.

In 2016, a quick response non-transport ALS (Advanced Life Support) unit was created. Squad 4 is stationed solely on the island responding to 911 calls between the hours of 9:00am and 9:00pm. The personnel working on the unit are trained by Marine Rescue to perform water rescue and lifeguard functions that complement their ability to act as a first on scene ALS unit. This Collaboration between EMS and Marine Rescue has provided a unique service to the island community by expanding lifeguard coverage and rapid ALS response to those with an emergency. The Squad 4 paramedic/ lifeguard unit has improved response times to emergency calls and promoted faster on scene times in life threatening emergencies.

The division stays true to their motto "When you are at your worst we are at our best".
