On my second to last day at work, I walked the shoreline at Haulover Beach at dawn and reminisce about all the good times I have had during my career and how I will genuinely miss this job. On my last day at work, I sat on the beach at Crandon Park at dusk as the sun sets on yet another chapter in my life and reflect on how lucky I was to have been employed at a place that I actually enjoyed coming to every day. I don't know how many people can say that and really mean it. Everyone loves to visit the beach, but I was blessed and fortunate enough to have spent my life/career, working at two great beaches. Retirement will be bitter sweet. Every day has been - "just another day in paradise." There were lots of good times (and a few, not so good) but how many people can truly say they loved their job (and get this) - got paid to work at the beach!

I remember my first beach day like it was yesterday. That day, Friday May 26, 1978, I realized what my career choice would be. I knew that I would spend the rest of my life at / on / in the water and by the ocean. My goals were to become the Beach Patrol Chief, to make a difference (every day) in the lives of the patrons that came to the beach, to help develop and change the profession of surf lifesaving and aquatic rescue for the better and to be part of an ever-growing professional industry. I soon joined and dutifully served on the Executive Boards of each: Florida Beach Patrol Chiefs Association - (President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Advisor) and the United States Lifesaving Association - (Advisor). Both Associations have helped make progressive changes in our profession by promoting public education and raising the standards of training and certification. From the individuals that came before us; to those that will follow, I believe we have accomplished that goal. Together we have made and will continue to make a huge difference in aquatics. From effecting rescues, to preventing accidents before they happen, by providing medical attention to the injured, by comforting those in need, by returning lost children to their parents, by answering patron questions, by protecting nature and the environment, by providing excellent customer service, by being public relations experts, by continuing aquatic safety education, by advocating for special risk status for all lifeguards, by making improvements to infrastructure, by continuing to develop our future through junior lifeguard programming, by making legislative change, etc., and ultimately ----- the saving of many lives.

During my time as an Ocean Lifeguard, I have seen people in their darkest hour as they have watched in horror/disbelief and with great sadness as we tried to save a friend or family member. I have also been part of their greatest joy as we saved their loved ones from the grasp of an unforgiving ocean. I can't think of too many things that provide such an incredible feeling of personal satisfaction; where making a positive difference in the way people live is viewed by us (public servants) as just a "part of the job." What could be more rewarding?

I thought this would be a good opportunity to thank the many aquatic professionals that I have met throughout the county, state, country and world, which I have had the pleasure to work with during the last 41 years. While working at pools and on the beach, at Park and Recreation and at Fire Rescue, I have met and worked with a lot of good people. Some of you have been true inspirations as well as mentors in my life. Most of you, I have grown to like and respect and there are several of you that I truly care for. Thank you for the 'good times' but most importantly, thank you for everything you have taught me, including the mantra -- Lifeguards for Life!!

We are known by many titles - Lifeguard / Lifesaver / Beach Patrol / Beach & Marine Safety / Ocean Rescue. Remember: not everyone can do this job; not everyone can swim like us -- <u>not everyone can be a Lifeguard.</u> Very few can go into a dangerous environment and risk their life to save another. Less than 1% of the population can do what we do. Be proud, feel honored and important about what you do. Don't ever let anyone put you down by saying, "oh, you are <u>just</u> a lifeguard." You are much more than that, **you are a saver of lives**!

In closing, I ask a few things of you. Most importantly, always be truthful with the person that looks back at you in the mirror. Stand up for others when you should and do the right thing even if it makes your peers uncomfortable. Remember, there is no right way to do the wrong thing. When you come to work bring your best. Make a difference – everyday! The people we proudly serve deserve nothing less, not to mention those that work by our side. For those of you that have made the choice to be officers, be a leader; not just the boss.

Finally, I want to say "**THANK YOU**" to all of my supporters. We've been through tough times together, but we made it. Keep up the good work and continue the principals **we** built together, moving forward. I will treasure the times we had. As I say farewell, an old lyric comes to mind - Na Na Na, Hey Hey, Goodbye. It's time to celebrate. ©

On 06/06/2016 at 19:20 hours, off-duty Miami-Dade Fire Rescue, Ocean Rescue Lifeguard Gregory Larson arrived home from work and began to unwind in his living room. Looking out his balcony over a lake next to his condo, he noticed something in the water. Upon further investigation, he realized it was a person. Since the lake is full of alligators, he thought it was strange to see someone in the water and went outside with a flotation device and verbally advised the person to get out of the water because it was dangerous. The woman stated that no one loved her and hoped that the alligators would eat her. Mr. Larson called 911 and told his neighbors that he was going to try to help her.

Without hesitation, he entered the water and swam nearly 200+ yards to get to her. She stated that she did not want to live and told him not to touch her because she was trying to drown herself. Mr. Larson continued talking to the woman, never leaving her side while trying to have her grab the buoy. After 30 minutes of dealing with the woman, back up arrived in the water on the scene. Mr. Larson and the Miami-Dade Fire Rescue Department rescue divers were able to bring the woman back to shore with great difficulty because she was constantly struggling. The woman was transported to the hospital to receive care.

Off duty Lifeguard Gregory Larson showed compassion for others by risking his own live to save another.

RECIPIENT: Christina Gillin-Theiss - (Palm Beach County)

It was Mother's Day, May 8, 2016 and a perfect day to celebrate with family and friends at the beach. Singer Island would be the perfect setting. While walking along the beach with her 4-year-old son, Brandon, a family friend was capturing the moment with a photograph. Her friend noticed (2) heads bobbing in the surf behind them and alerted Christina.

Immediately, she realized that the (2) teenagers needed assistance. Palm Beach County Lifeguards were on duty at a nearby county park but this situation could not wait for a call for assistance. Christina had been a trained Ocean Lifeguard and worked many summers along the New Jersey shore. Ensuring her child's safety, and then attempting to locate any floatation device, she had no option but to willingly jeopardize her safety and assist the teens without the benefit of a rescue device. She contacted both struggling victims and brought them to a nearby coral rock formation. She was able maintain their heads above water until county lifeguards responded. Once safely on the beach, the teens were medically assessed and required no further medical attention.

Christina Gillin-Theiss is to be commended for her quick action which directly averted tragic consequences.

Mike continued CPR for several minutes until Engine 6 and Marine Rescue Lieutenant V. Coursey arrived on scene. ALS care was initiated and the individual was transported to the hospital.

The Doctors that treated the patient indicated that CPR was what allowed her to make a full recovery. This is due to the quick actions of LG Supervisor Mike Rosenberg. To this day, the patient refers to Mike and the other responders as her "Guardian Angel".

Palm Beach County Ocean Rescue provides a safe and enjoyable beach experience throughout the 47 miles of coastal beach. This is accomplished by providing visitors (11) ocean front parks and (3) intra-coastal parks. The professional, well trained, and dedicated Ocean Rescue staff accept this responsibility seriously.

The Ocean Rescue Agency has 66 full-time employees and 40 seasonal employees which includes, Ocean Rescue Lieutenants and Supervisory staff. The 3 ocean inlets in Palm Beach County have either an inflatable rescue boat or a rescue water craft that can respond to distressed boaters. Visitors to Palm Beach County beaches totaled 4.72 million. Staff initiated 93,710 preventative actions, responded to 201 water rescues, and provided medical treatment on 80 major medical responses.

The agency's Public Education outreach interacted with 9,000 children and families and participated in a total of 13 events throughout the year. Special events included the annual Junior Lifeguard Program, Lifeguard Competitions, Ocean Mile Swims, and supervision for the Loggerhead Triathlon which had 700 participants.

Selection for this prestigious award is based on a written nomination by each individual agency with adherence to the nomination criteria. These criteria involve: goals and objectives, public education outreach, sponsorship / participation in special events, and significant contributions to the profession of ocean lifesaving, just to name a few. The selection for this recognition is always difficult. Since all member agencies share in the goal of public safety, it is necessary to recognize the fine difference that separates the selected agency from the other nominees.
